Parks Canada

Some of the most treasured gifts we as Canadians have are our National Parks, Historic Sites and Marine Conservation Areas. As part of the Canada 150 Celebration events, Parks Canada is having free admission to all of its sites this year. Below you will find a brief explanation of what Parks Canada is all about and a list of all of its sites within Newfoundland and Labrador. Go and enjoy!

National Parks

National parks are established to protect and present outstanding representative examples of natural landscapes and natural phenomena that occur in Canada's 39 natural regions. These wild places, located in every province and territory, range from mountains and plains, to boreal forests and tundra, to lakes and glaciers, and much more. National parks protect the habitats, wildlife and ecosystem diversity representative of - and sometime unique to - the natural regions.

National parks tell the stories of Canada's natural beginnings - mountains forming, lakes emerging, rivers running, forests growing, glaciers moving, grasslands evolving - to anyone who takes the time to listen, to look and to understand. They tell tales of human history too, from traditional Aboriginal activities, to early exploration, to European settlement, to modern use. And they reveal ongoing natural processes - floods enriching,

fires renewing, species migrating. They provide opportunities to connect with nature, people and events that define Canada.

Understanding the importance of Canada's natural heritage to the nation and the world, and developing support for its protection are critical to the long-term health of the system of national parks.

The national parks of Canada are a source of pride for Canadians and an integral part of our identity, they celebrate the beauty and infinite variety of our land.

National Historic Sites

National historic sites are places of profound importance to Canada. They reflect the rich heritage of our country and provide an opportunity for Canadians to learn more about our diversity, including the history, cultures and contributions of Indigenous Peoples. Canada's first national historic site was designated in 1917. Today, there are more than 970 national historic sites; of these, 171 are administered by Parks Canada. Come discover these amazing places where history happened.

Elder Abuse

As I'm putting this newsletter together, I remembered that Elder Abuse Awareness Day is coming up June 15th. We never think this will happen to us or anyone we know, but it never hurts to be aware of what elder abuse is and how to recognize it. (The following information is taken from the Canadian Government's website https://www.canada.ca/en/employment-social-development/campaigns/elder-abuse/reality.html). We're all going in the same direction so let's look out for one another.

It's estimated that one in five Canadians believes they know of a senior who might be experiencing some form of abuse. Seniors from all walks of life are vulnerable to elder abuse and it is happening in communities across Canada. Outlined here is basic information on how seniors and Canadians can spot elder abuse as well as information on how to help stop it.

What is elder abuse?

Elder abuse is any action by someone in a relationship of trust that results in harm or distress to an older person. Neglect is a lack of action by that person in a relationship of trust with the same result. Commonly recognized types of elder abuse include physical, psychological and financial. Often, more than one type of abuse occurs at the same time. Abuse can be a single incident or a repeated

pattern of behaviour.

Financial abuse is the most commonly reported type of elder abuse.

Why does elder abuse happen?

Elder abuse often occurs because of the abuser's power and control over an older person. In some situations, the abuse may also result from addiction issues (drugs, alcohol or gambling), mental health problems, a cycle of family violence or ageism. Abuse can happen when the aggressor wants to intimidate, isolate, dominate or control another person.

Who abuses seniors?

Older adults affected by abuse often know and trust the person mistreating them. Elder abuse can be caused by a family member, a friend, someone who provides assistance with basic needs or services, or health care providers in institutional settings. In many situations of elder abuse, the abuser is dependent on the older adult for money, food or shelter.

Who is affected by elder abuse?

Most older people who experience abuse are able to make decisions for themselves.

Abuse can happen to anyone, in any family or relationship. It can happen to people of all backgrounds, ages, religions, races, cultures and ethnic origins. Why are some older adults reluctant to talk about elder abuse? Older adults may feel ashamed or embarrassed to tell anyone they are being abused

by someone they trust. They may fear retaliation or punishment, or they may have concerns about having to move from their home or community. They may also feel a sense of family loyalty. Often, older adults may not be aware of people and resources that can help.

Who can help?

It is important that the older person have access to information to make informed decisions and be aware of available help. This may include support and assistance from family members or friends, health care providers, social services, police, legal professionals and/or members of faith communities. No one ever deserves to be abused or neglected.

What are indicators of elder abuse and neglect?

Elder abuse and neglect can be very difficult to detect. The following signs and symptoms may indicate that an older adult is being victimized or neglected:

- fear, anxiety, depression or passiveness in relation to a family member, friend or care provider;
- unexplained physical injuries;
- dehydration, poor nutrition or poor hygiene;
- improper use of medication;
- confusion about new legal documents, such as a new will or a new mortgage;

- sudden drop in cash flow or financial holdings; and
- reluctance to speak about the situation.

Physical abuse of seniors

Physical abuse of seniors includes actions that injure or risk injuring an older person or cause them physical pain and may include:

- striking;
- hitting;
- pushing;
- shaking;
- burning;
- shoving:
- inappropriate physical and chemical restraints; or
- harm created by over or under medicating.

Psychological abuse of seniors

Psychological abuse of seniors includes actions that decrease their sense of self-worth and dignity, and may include:

- insults;
- threats;
- intimidation;
- humiliation;

- harassment;
- treating them like a child; or
- isolating them from family, friends or regular activities.

Financial abuse of seniors

Financial abuse includes actions that decrease the financial worth of an older person without benefit to that person and may include:

- misusing or stealing a senior's assets, property or money;
- cashing an elderly person's cheques without authorization;
- forging an elderly person's signature;
- unduly pressuring seniors to make or change a will, or to sign legal documents that they do not fully understand; and
- sharing an older person's home without paying a fair share of the expenses when requested.

Neglect of seniors

Neglect includes inactions that may result in harm to an older person and may include a caregiver or family member not providing appropriate:

- water or food;
- shelter;
- clothing;

- medication or medical attention; and
- assistance with basic necessities.

Seniors most vulnerable to neglect include those who are socially isolated, and those with serious health conditions.

Abuse happens when one person hurts or mistreats another. Remember:

- Seniors are entitled to respect.
- Seniors have every right to live in safety and security.
- There is no excuse for abuse.



Jerry was hired as a Journeyman Mechanic Machinist on March 3, 1997. He retired on May 31, 2017.


Marg Snow
